

KHRUSHCHEV SAYS THAT THE 1956 UPRISING IN HUNGARY WAS INSPIRED FROM OUTSIDE.

London, May 6. (Reuter) Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev has said in a letter to Hungarian workers that it now is "clear to everybody" that the 1956 uprising in Hungary was counter-revolutionary and "inspired from outside," the official Soviet News Agency TASS reported today. The letter was released today. Khrushchev was replying to a message from workers at Csepel -five miles from Budapest, and scene of some of the most bitter fighting in the uprising- to mark the first anniversary of the visit of a Soviet party and government delegation.

Tass quoted the Hungarian message, adopted at meetings attended by 24,000 workers, as saying the workers were "inspired by the achievements of the socialist party and the correct policy of the party and government."

Referring to the 1956 uprising, Khrushchev said it was organized by the enemies of the Hungarian people -"conspirators who cleverly exploited the mistakes of the former Hungarian leaders," Tass reported. Khrushchev said that "fabrications" alleging that the rebellion was in the interests of workers and peasants were made by "bourgeois politicians and venal hacks deprived of common sense." He added: "Who can believe that the people will inflict serious injuries upon themselves. If this would really be the case, how could the wounds inflicted by the rebellion be healed so rapidly? The Hungarian working class, by its heroic labor, not only rapidly liquidated the consequences of the counter-revolutionary rebellion but also was able to make big progress in building socialism. The Soviet people and the Communist Party of the Soviet Union rejoice in these successes."
