

U.N. RUBBER-STAMPS HUNGARIAN RESOLUTION

Moscow, TASS, in Russian Hellschreiber to Europe, Sept. 15, 1957, 0217 GMT--L

(Text) Moscow--On the eve of the opening of the 12th session of the U.N. General Assembly, IZVESTIA writes today, U.S. ruling circles have sharply intensified their subversive activities against peace and security.

The United States, together with its NATO partners, have in fact undermined the work of the subcommittee of the U.N. Disarmament Commission. With the aim of poisoning the international atmosphere, they staged a shameful spectacle on the so-called Hungarian question. Finally, the Washington leaders started a very risky game in the Arab East, by organizing a conspiracy against Syria's independence.

American diplomacy, IZVESTIA continues, harbored the illusion that the United States could carry out their military-political diversion unhampered and come to the 12th session of the U.N. General Assembly fully armed with the position-of-strength policy.

However, the paper remarks, it miscalculated badly. The special Hungarian session was obviously a failure, though it did rubber-stamp the American resolution. Not a single delegation, except the coauthors of the provocative American resolution, supported the United States.

At the same time, the newspaper continues, when voices were raised from the platform which unmasked the gross interference of the United States in the domestic affairs of Hungary and other socialist countries, American diplomats were transformed from hypocritical accusers into accused, powerless to reject facts.

The greatest failure, the newspaper stresses, overtook American diplomacy in her attempts to spread a smokescreen of misinformation and slander over the colonial intrigues of the United States in the Near and Middle East.

The calculations of American diplomacy, the article continues, of open support by some Arab countries for American aggressive plans were far from realized. American intrigues regarding Syria were exposed to the world by the Soviet Union. A grave warning has been issued by the Soviet side concerning the dangerous consequences of these intrigues for the organizers themselves.

The miscalculations of American diplomacy, IZVESTIA concludes, were begotten by a policy which is doomed to failure.

(Editor's Note:) The Soviet Home service reported the adoption of the U.N. resolution on Hungary by a vote of 60 to 10, with 10 abstentions. The report, which was broadcast in the bulletin at 1600 GMT, Sept. 14, followed a two-minute summary of Sobolev's speech at this session. The report listed the countries which voted against the resolution and those which abstained. There was no comment.)

TOPCHIEV PROTESTS REPORT ON HUNGARY

(Text) Moscow--The U.N. Association in the USSR has expressed its profound indignation concerning the report of the special U.N. committee, the notorious committee of five, on the so-called Hungarian question.

In a letter signed by the chairman of the central board of the association, Academician Topchiyev, and Secretary Polyakov, sent to the U.N. information center in Moscow, it is pointed out that the association draws attention to the illegal nature of the work of the committee of five, formed in direct violation of Para. 7, Art. 2, of the U.N. Charter, which prohibits interference in internal affairs of sovereign states who are members of the United Nations.

The work of this illegally established committee is in glaring contrast to the aims and tasks of the United Nations, aimed at achieving peace and cooperation between peoples, and it violates the basic norms and principles of international law.

It is noted in the letter that the authors of the report failed to disguise to any extent the tendentious nature of the document they prepared. It ignores completely the tremendous mass of facts mentioned in the official publications of the Government of the Hungarian People's Republic and in the statements of unbiased witnesses of the events in Hungary.

The report of the special committee is based mainly on unfounded inventions of violent enemies of the people's order, the same reactionary plotters with whose help foreign imperialist circles organized the fascist uprising against the Hungarian People's Republic in the autumn of 1956.

Endeavoring to shield the foreign inspirers and organizers of the fascist uprising, the authors of the report simply keep silent about hundreds and thousands of facts which prove irrefutably the decisive role played by foreign reaction in the organization of the uprising, a role which showed itself in the most varied forms, beginning with systematic inciting propaganda by the radio station Free Europe to the dispatch of thousands and thousands of armed diversionists to Hungary, from the secret delivery of weapons to the drafting of spies and traitors for subversion of the people's democratic order in the country.
