NÉPAKARAT, organ of the National Association of Hungarian Trade Unions, published several interesting reports on the mysteries of the RAKOSI villa. Papers lie about in greatest disorder on the desk. What can these two letters, sent by one murderer to the other, be about? Who had to be accused so speedily with treason or conspiracy?

NÉPSZAVA, reports on the Tuesday session of the Austrian Parliament. MAGYAR HONVÉD, writes: Leaders of delegations questioned Imre NAGY and Ferenc ERDEI on whether RAKOSI received asylum in the Soviet Union or only crossed the border? The government leaders answered that when order has been restored "The traitor RAKOSI will be extradited from the Soviet Union according to international law and will stand trial." It will be revealed then whether he received asylum or only escaped across the border.

MAGYAR IFJUSÁG, the organ of the Revolutionary Council of Young Workers says: We do not want Soviet oppression, but the landlords, industrialists, financiers, Miklos HORTHY and soldiers of any kind of nationality should remain where they are now.
