

NEUE ZURCHER ZEITUNG (18 September) reports from Budapest that Budapest's reaction to the G.A. resolution shows that the Hungarian Communists find the result of the voting very painful, but they are resolved to ignore the resolutions of the G.A.

All statements of the Hungarian press and the authoritative representatives of the regime are bringing the same description of the October events and the same accusations against the "imperialists" as the Hungarian Delegate read in his speech in the G.A.

"They sowed storm and harvested calm" writes the Party organ NEPSZABADSAG (15 September) in its editorial and tries to belittle the resolution of the 60 nations condemning the Soviet Union and terror-justice of Kadar. In the comment of the paper there is not a single word that not even the so-called anti-Western Asiatic and African countries could take the responsibility to vote against the resolution.

The only thing that NEPSZABADSAG could publish as defence was recriminations about Algeria, Yemen and Oman.

The United States, even if it was difficult, gained one thing: they managed to secure the necessary "majority" for their resolution, says NEPSZABADSAG and continues: "But they knew it from the very beginning, as it was known to everybody, that the special session of the G.A. has no right and no means to decide on an effective resolution. The resolution of the G.A. cannot be implemented. How could Chang-Kai-Shek or Cuba or even the United States decide that Prince Wan should carry out investigations in Hungary. Being aware of our rights and according to the Charter of the U.N. we shall not accept investigations in our country; to investigate and to bring about order is exclusively our right. Mr. Hammarskjold, whom we have invited several times, and Prince Wan could visit our country as private persons any time. They will be welcomed. But there is no room for any investigation in our country," says the paper.

The only thing that NEPSZABADSAG could write as a defence was that the discussion in the G.A. was "tormenting (and) futile" and its result was: "apathy, unconcern and boredom."

The article ends with a recrimination that "during the time that the G.A. approved a resolution about events which happened in Hungary a year ago, in Algeria, in Yemen and Oman, patriots are losing their life in defence of their country".
