Ambassador Nicholas Rey was nominated to the U.S. Ambassador to the Republic of Poland on September 28, 1993. He presented his credentials to President Lech Walesa on December 22, 1993.

Ambassador Rey was born on January 23, 1938, in Warsaw, Poland.

Ambassador Rey's education includes a Baccalaureate of Arts Degree from Princeton University in 1960, and a Master of Arts Degree from the Advanced International Studies School at Johns Hopkins University in 1963. Ambassador Rey fluently speaks five foreign languages: Polish, French, Spanish, Portuguese, and German. During his studies at Johns Hopkins, he joined the Army Reserves where he served from 1962-1968.

Ambassador Rey started his professional career in the Department of the Treasury, first as an economist from 1963-1967, and secondly, as the Director to the Executive Secretariat and Staff Assistant to the Secretary of the Treasury from 1967-1968. During the later year Ambassador Rey was made vice President of Drexel Harriman Ripley, Inc. The following year, 1970, he was appointed a staff member to the President's Commission on International Trade and Investment Policy. The next twenty-one years saw Ambassador Rey as the Managing Director of two firms. Merrill Lynch Capital Markets from 1971-1978 and at Vear, Stearns, and Co. from 1987 to 1992. In 1990, Ambassador Rey was made the Vice Chairman and Director of the Polish-American Enterprise Fund, and in 1993 was made the Managing Director of Integrated Control Systems, Inc.

He and his wife the former Louisa Gawtry Machado, has three children, Cecilia, Anthony, and Michael.

Donald M. Blinken
American Ambassador to Hungary

Donald M. Blinken has been director of E.M. Warburg, Pincus & Co., Inc., since 1987. He began his career in 1949 as an assistant buyer at Bloomingdale's in New York. He served as vice president of Exchange Trading Corp., New York, which included an assignment to Marks & Spencer in London, 1950-53. In 1953 he became vice president and merchandise manager of Steins Stores, Inc., New York.

After working as assistant to the president of Marketing & Merchandise Research, Inc., New York, Mr. Blinken was named vice president of E. M. Warburg & Co., Inc. in 1959. He was a founding partner of E. M. Warburg Pincus & Co., Inc., the successor firm, in 1966. In 1970 he became vice president. He was managing director of the firm, 1981-86.

In addition to his banking responsibilities, Mr. Blinken served as chairman of State University of New York, the nation's largest public education system, 1978-90. He has also served as president of the Mark Rothko Foundation and the Brooklyn Academy of Music; as chairman of Commentary Publications, Inc.; and as a member of the special presidential nominating panel for the U.S. Court of Appeals. He is currently vice president and director of the American Hungarian Friendship Forum; vice chairman and director of the New York Philharmonic Symphony Society; overseer of the Nelson A. Rockefeller Institute of Government; a trustee of the Institute of International Education, the New York Public Library and the Isamu Noguchi Foundation; and a member of the trustee council of the National Gallery of Art.

Mr. Blinken was born in New York on November 11, 1925. He earned a bachelor's from Harvard and holds an honorary doctorate from the State University of New York. He served in the Army Air Force, 1944-45. He is the author of a book on American trade policy and articles on education and international affairs. He is married to Veronica Blinken. His brother, Alan Blinken, is the ambassador to Belgium. His son, Anthony Blinken, is a special assistant in the Bureau of European Affairs.

MISSIONS AND FUNCTIONS

Support and advance U.S. interest and policies throughout the assigned area of responsibility; provide combat ready land, maritime, and air forces to Allied Command Europe or U.S. unified commands; and conduct operations unilaterally or in concert with coalition partners.

U.S. Commitment to NATO:

USEUCOM's primary mission in support of NATO is to provide combat-ready forces to support U.S. commitments to the NATO alliance.

Readiness of U.S. Forces:

Extensive training is conducted to ensure combat readiness.

Crisis Management:

Although planning for NATO conflict is first priority at USEUCOM, consideration is also given to unilateral and multilateral contingency planning. This includes providing forces to other unified commands, and ranges from humanitarian relief to support of friendly governments with supplies.

Intelligence Activities:

The headquarters is responsible for theater-wide coordination of intelligence activities. Once collected and analyzed, information is passed to decision makers. The command maintains an accurate picture of the area of responsibility and provide responsive support to the Joint Chiefs of Staff, the military services and Allied Command Europe.

Security Assistance:

The purpose of security assistance is to help friendly nations maintain their control, resist aggression, and contribute to collective security. It includes foreign military sales, credits and grant aid for training programs, equipment and other assistance to allied and friendly countries in USEUCOM's area of responsibility. The US. Commander in Chief, Europe, directs and supervises all security assistance actions, commands the Military Assistance Advisory Groups and Offices of Defense Cooperation in his area of responsibility, correlates security assistance plans and programs with U.S. military plans and submits such plans and proposals to the Secretary of Defense.

Non-Combatant Evacuation: This headquarters plans for and executes as appropriate, the protection and evacuation of U.S. non-combatants in the USEUCOM area of responsibility.

Humanitarian Relief:

When requested, USEUCOM provides humanitarian relief in the event of natural disasters or crises.

USEUCOM STAFF

This joint staff and its direct reporting units consists of some 1200 servicemen and women: about 495 Army, 475 Air Force, 200 Navy and 38 Marines in 27 countries. About 365 US. civilians are also on the staff.

COMMAND AND CONTROL

The command center at Patch Barracks is the nucleus of the USEUCOM command and control system. It links the headquarters with the Joint Chiefs of Staff, other unified and specified commands, Supreme Headquarters Allied Powers Europe, and component headquarters.

The command center is the focal point where the commander in chief or his deputy monitors and maintains contact with USEUCOM forces. Employment of strategic forces assigned to the command and committed to U.S. and NATO missions, is coordinated and directed from the command center.

HISTORY

The origin of USEUCOM dates back to the earliest days of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO), when the Joint Chiefs of Staff (JCS) created HQ USEUCOM on 1 August 1952 to facilitate its treaty obligations. One of America's promises to NATO was provide US. combat forces, under the operational control of the NATO commander in wartime, for the defense of Europe.

Reasons of both economy and efficiency prompted the creation of the senior US. military headquarters in Europe to serve, then as now, as the focal point for controlling, coordinating and facilitating American support to NATO. Similar reasoning dictated that the same American general would serve as both the Supreme Allied Commander Europe (SACEUR) of NATO forces and the US. Commander in Chief Europe (USCINCEUR) of American forces in Europe. Besides centralizing command responsibility, the new command arrangement gave the overall American commander full control of the administrative and logistic support forces in Europe.

Because of the magnitude of his dual assignment, coupled with the necessity of spending most of his time at this NATO Headquarters, SHAPE, USCINCEUR delegated broad authority for both the direction and control of the USEUCOM staff to his Deputy. Succeeding USCINCEUR's have continued this practice to the present day.

Temporarily housed in the I.G. Farben Building in Frankfurt, Germany, HQ USEUCOM moved in 1954 to permanent quarters at Camp des Loges in the forest of St Germaine-en-Lay, France. Here less than an hours drive from SACEUR's NATO Headquarters in Paris, it remained until March 1966, when General de Gaulle asked all foreign military headquarters to leave French soil.

To comply with this request the SACEUR/USCINCEUR moved with SHAPE to a location near Mons, Belgium. The Deputy USCINCEUR moved with HQ USEUCOM to Patch Barracks and commenced operations there at midnight on 14 March 1967.

PATCH HISTORY IN BRIEF

This 57-acre patch of forested ground, nine miles from downtown Stuttgart, has shaken from the heavy tread of countless warriors throughout the ages - ranging from ancient Celts, Alemanni, and Romans to the modern day French, North Africans and Americans. Originally built in 1936-7 to quarter a German Regiment, the kaserne fell into Allied hands after World War II and became first the Headquarters Seventh Army then Headquarters, United States European Command.

Its first tenant, the 7th Panzer Regiment of the German Wehrmacht, took possession on 7 May 1938. The installation was named the Kurmarker Kaserne in memory of the Prussian cavalry regiment from which it traced its lineage. To symbolize the speed and hitting power of their new tanks, the 7th chose the buffalo as their regimental insignia and erected a 7-foot high granite statue. Among its success, the 7th helped launch the world's first blitzkrieg against Poland, spearheaded the conquest of France, led the Panzer attack into Russia to within a few miles of Moscow, and finally, dealt the Americans a crippling blow at Kasserine Pass, before being surrounded and captured in Tunisia in May 1943 by Allied Forces.

In the closing days of World War II, French troops pushed into Stuttgart from the west, while the U.S 100th Infantry Division fought its way south from Heilbronn. With peace, American soldiers moved into the rubble-littered Kurmarker Kaserne to await their return home. On 1 April 1946, the 15th Constabulary Squadron was activated here followed by the Headquarters, U.S. Constabulary in 1948.

The buffalo statue which survived the Allied air attacks disappeared. Its whereabouts remain a mystery, although evidence suggests the granite statue was buried in a bomb crater.

In 1950, Headquarters, Seventh Army was reactivated at Kurmarker Kaserne absorbing the constabulary force there. The Kaserne was renamed Patch Barracks on 20 August 1951, in honor of the general who had led the Seventh Army to victory in World War II. In late 1966, Seventh Army headquarters moved to prepare for Headquarters, U.S. European Command's departure from France.

Headquarters, U.S. European Command began operations at Patch Barracks on 14 March 1967, where it still resides - a worthy successor to the many warrior units that preceded it.



GENERAL GEORGE A. JOULWAN **Supreme Allied Commander, Europe** **Commander-in-Chief, United States European Command**

General George A. Joulwan (Jahl'win), United States Army, is Supreme Allied Commander, Europe and Commander-in-Chief, United States European Command, Stuttgart, Germany. He assumed this position on 21 October 1993.

General Joulwan was born in Pottsville, PA, on November 16, 1939. He graduated from the U.S. Military Academy at West Point in 1961 and was commissioned a second lieutenant in the Infantry. He received a Master of Arts degree in political science from Loyola University in Chicago. General Joulwan's military education includes the Infantry Officer Basic Course, the Armor Officer Advance Course, the Command and General Staff College and the Army War College. He was an ROTC instructor at Loyola University, a tactical officer in the Department of Tactics at the U.S. Military Academy, and director of Political and Economical Studies at the Army War College.



He has held a variety of command and staff positions during four tours in Europe, two combat tours in Vietnam and several tours in Washington, D.C.

During his fourteen years in Germany, he served as a platoon leader, company commander, battalion commander, brigade commander, division chief of staff, and the Deputy Chief of Staff, Operations for U.S. Army, Europe. He also served in a joint assignment as special assistant to the Supreme Allied Commander, Europe at Supreme Headquarters, Allied Powers, Europe, and commanded the 3d Armored Division from March 1988 to August 1989.

In Vietnam, he served as a company commander and the S-3 in the 1st Battalion, 26th Infantry, 1st Infantry Division, and as a brigade S-3 and deputy G-3 of the 101st Airborne Division (Air Assault).

In Washington, D.C., after an assignment as assistant executive officer to the Vice Chief of Staff, U.S. Army, he served in joint assignments as special assistant to the President of the United States in the Office of the President, and executive to the Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff. He was next assigned as Director, Force Requirements (Combat Support Systems) in the Office of the Deputy Chief of Staff for Operations and Plans, Department of the Army. From August 1989 to November 1990, General Joulwan was commanding general of V Corps under U.S. Army Europe and Seventh Army. He was promoted to his present rank of general on November 9, 1990.

General Joulwan became Commander in Chief of the United States Southern Command on

November 21, 1990. As such, he was responsible for all U.S. military activities in Latin America (except Mexico and the Caribbean) and for implementing U.S. national security policy and strategy in the region.

Military awards and decorations which General Joulwan has received include the Defense Distinguished Service Medal with oak leaf cluster, Distinguished Service Medal, Silver Star with oak leaf cluster, Legion of Merit with oak leaf cluster, Bronze Star Medal with V device and two oak leaf clusters, several Air Medals, Meritorious Service Medal with three oak leaf clusters, Joint Service Commendation Medal, Army Commendation Medal with oak leaf cluster, Combat Infantryman Badge, Parachutist Badge, Ranger Tab, and Expert Infantry Badge. He holds the Presidential Service Badge, the Joint Chiefs of Staff Identification Badge and the Army Staff Identification Badge.

General Joulwan is married to the former Karen E. Jones. They have three daughters: Jennifer, Christen, and Jessica.

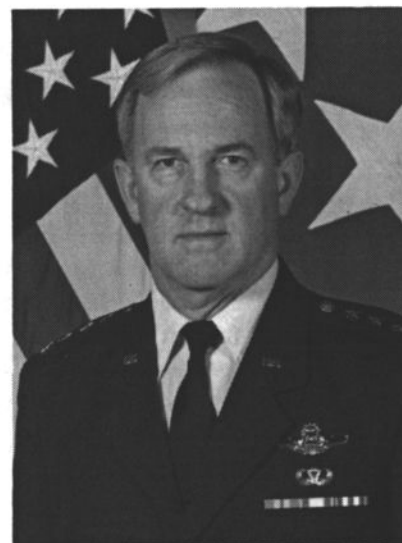

GENERAL JAMES L. JAMERSON Deputy Commander in Chief

General James L. Jamerson is Deputy Commander in Chief, U.S. European Command, Stuttgart-Vaihingen, Germany. He oversees the daily activities of a unified command with an area of responsibility encompassing 83 countries and more than 13 million square miles. The command supports and advances U.S. interests and policies throughout the area. Also, it provides combat-ready forces in support of U.S. commitments to the NATO Alliance.

The General was born and raised in Chapel Hill, N.C., and entered the Air Force in 1963 following graduation from the U.S. Air Force Academy. He has commanded two Air Force fighter wings, a joint task force during Operation Desert Storm and a combined task force in humanitarian operations in Turkey and Iraq. He has also served in the Pentagon and on the NATO staff at Supreme Headquarters Allied Powers Europe and as an Air Combat Command Numbered Air Force Commander. Before assuming his current position, he was Commander, U.S. Air Forces in Europe and Commander, Allied Air Forces Central Europe, with headquarters at Ramstein Air Base, Germany. He is a Command pilot, having flown more than 5,000 hours, principally in attack and fighter aircraft. He flew 184 combat missions in Southeast Asia in the A-1 Skyraider.

MAJOR GENERAL JAMES D. DAVIS, SR. **Director, Mobilization and Reserve Component Affairs**

Major General James D. Davis, Sr., is the Director of Mobilization and Reserve Component Affairs, United States European Command, Stuttgart-Vaihingen, Germany. He assumed this position in September 1996.

Major General James D. Davis, Sr., began his military career in the Georgia Army National Guard in February 1957. Commissioned through the Georgia Military Institute as a Lieutenant of Armor in 1964, he served with Headquarters and Headquarters Company, 1st Battalion, 108th Armor as a Mortar Platoon Leader and Transportation Section Leader.
