INTERNATIONAL CONGRESS OF LIBRARIANS MEETS IN MUNICH.

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The 22nd session of the IFIA council (International Federation of the Association of Librarians) took place in MUNICH on September 2-4 1956. 120 delegates from various countries attended the meetings at MUNICH's Technical Academy. Among the delegates were two Poles from WARSAW and several Yugoslavs from ZAGREB (the complete list of participants is available at the General Desk, Evaluation and Research Section.)

On the last day of the conference, the Polish delegates suggested that the next session be held in WARSAW. This proposal was politely rejected by the council, because France has been waiting for her turn for almost 20 years. The next congress will, therefore, be held in France. When during the

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discussions somebody mentioned the "countries behind the Iron Curtain," the Polish delegate Mrs. I. MORSZTYNKIEWICZ objected, saying: "there is no Iron Curtain and no countries behind the Iron Curtain -- there are only countries of Eastern Europe...."

The Hungarian delegation consisting of A. HENCZ, director of the SZEGED University library, and Dr. Sandor VARJAS, director of the "SZECHENYI" Library failed to appear.

The Rumanian delegation gave notice from East BERLIN that they could not come to MUNICH because of visa difficulties.

The Polish delegation arrived by train via SCHIRNDING and the two delegates stayed at a boarding house on Amalienstrasse.

On September 3 1956 the Poles participated in a reception given by the Bavarian State Government in honor of the delegates. After the reception the delegates proceeded to MUNICH's traditional beer center, the "Hofbraeuhaus." Mrs. MORSZTYNKIEWICZ did not like the proletarian atmosphere in the great hall beneath the restaurant. "It is dirty," she said, "just look at the vulgar mob..."

Mr. C. KOZIOŁ, the other Polish delegate, is 40 years old and in Germany for the first time. He told our reporter that he was very favorably impressed and surprised to see so many friendly faces. "I thought all Germans were Hitlerites."
